# GANGETIC RIVER DOLPHIN & INDUS RIVER DOLPHIN: ENVIRONMENT

**NEWS**: India is conducting an 8,000-km aquatic survey focusing on its freshwater whales – the Ganges (Platanista gangetica) and Indus (Platanista minor) dolphins.


#### WHAT'S IN THE NEWS?

According to an analysis of the Indus and Ganges River dolphins, it was found they are not one but two separate different species.

- Current Classification: Indus and Ganges River dolphins are currently classified as subspecies of South Asian river dolphins (Platanista Gangetic).
- New Research Findings: DNA analysis reveals clear genetic differences between Indus and Ganges River dolphins, including differences in teeth, color, growth patterns, and skull shapes, confirming them as separate species.

### Gangetic River Dolphin:

- **Habitat**: Found in the Ganges, Brahmaputra rivers, and their tributaries in India, Bangladesh, and Nepal. They live only in freshwater.
- Conservation Status:
  - IUCN: Endangered
  - CITES: Appendix I
  - Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972: Schedule 1
- Threats: Dams, reduced river flow, mechanized boats causing injury.




#### **Indus River Dolphin:**

- Habitat: Found in Pakistan and River Beas in Punjab, India.
- **Population**: Increased from 1,200 (2001) to 2,000 (2017).
- State Animal: Punjab's state aquatic animal.
- Conservation Status: IUCN: Endangered.
