
WHAT'S IN THE NEWS?

India, with 2.4% of the world's land area, hosts 7-8% of global species, including critically endangered ones like the **Kashmir Stag** (Kashmir Valley) and **Great Indian Bustard** (Rajasthan). Challenges include habitat destruction and human-wildlife conflicts, highlighted on **World Wildlife Conservation Day** (December 4).

India's Biodiversity

- Land Area: India occupies only 2.4% of the world's land but houses 7-8% of global species.
- Species Diversity: Includes 45,000 plant species and 91,000 animal species, making it one of the world's megadiverse countries.
- **Biodiversity Hotspots**: Four recognized globally:
 - 1. Himalayas
 - 2. Indo-Burma
 - 3. Western Ghats-Sri Lanka
 - 4. Sundaland (includes Nicobar Islands).

Importance of World Wildlife Conservation Day

• Observed on **December 4**, it highlights the **importance of protecting biodiversity** and reviews efforts to conserve **critically endangered species**.

Challenges to Conservation

- Economic Growth and Population Pressure: Increasing demand for land, timber, and resources leads to habitat destruction.
- **Human-Wildlife Conflicts**: Driven by shrinking habitats and expanding human settlements.

Critically Endangered Species in India

• As of 2022, 73 species are classified as critically endangered (up from 47 in 2011, as per IUCN).

Key Examples:

1. Mammals

- Kashmir Stag (Hangul): Found in Kashmir Valley; threats include habitat loss and poaching.
- Malabar Large-spotted Civet: Endemic to the Western Ghats; population fragmented due to hunting and deforestation.
- Andaman Shrew: Native to the Andaman Islands; threatened by invasive species and deforestation.
- Nicobar Shrew: Restricted to the Nicobar Islands; vulnerable to habitat encroachment.
- Namdapha Flying Squirrel: Found only in Namdapha National Park, Arunachal Pradesh.


2. Birds

Great Indian Bustard: Found in Rajasthan and parts of Gujarat; population <150 individuals, threatened by agriculture and power lines.
