

### TAGGING OF GANGES RIVER DOLPHIN - ENVIRONMENT

**NEWS:** First-ever Ganges river dolphin (Platanista gangetica) was tagged in Assam on **December 18, 2023**, marking a significant achievement under **Project Dolphin**.

#### WHAT'S IN THEN NEWS?

- **Objective:** Tagging will facilitate understanding of:
  - Seasonal and migratory patterns.
  - Range, distribution, and habitat utilization, especially in disturbed river systems.
- **Significance:** Tagging is expected to contribute to evidence-based conservation strategies.

# **Overview of Ganges River Dolphin**

- Scientific Classification: Belongs to the family Platanistidae, comprising two extant species:
  - Ganges river dolphin.
  - Indus river dolphin.



- Physical Characteristics:
  - Males: Length of 2–2.2 meters; females slightly longer at 2.4–2.6 meters.



#### MAKING YOU SERVE THE NATION

- Weight: 70–90 kilograms.
- Diet: Includes various fish and invertebrates.
- **Behavioral Traits:** Typically found alone or in small groups; extremely shy around boats, making them challenging to observe.
- Cultural Significance: Known by various local names (e.g., susu in Hindi, shushuk in Bengali, hihu in Assamese) and often associated with Goddess Ganga in Indian mythology.

## **Declining Population and Endangered Status**

- **Distribution:** Historically found in Ganges-Brahmaputra-Meghna and Karnaphuli-Sanguriver systems (India, Bangladesh, Nepal).
- Current Status: Now extinct in many original ranges; estimated population of 3,500–5,000 individuals.
- Conservation Status: Listed as 'Endangered' in the IUCN Red List since the 1990s.
- Key Threats:
  - 1. Dams and Barrages: Obstruct movement, food supply, and breeding.
  - 2. **River Pollution:** Deteriorates habitat quality.
  - 3. Poaching: Targeted for oily blubber; accidental entanglement in fishing nets.
  - 4. Shrinking Habitat: Drying rivers reduce navigable spaces.

#### **Conservation Efforts**

#### Wildlife Act Protection (1986)

- Inclusion in First Schedule: Gangetic dolphins protected under Indian Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972.
- Sanctuary Establishment: Creation of Vikramshila Ganges Dolphin Sanctuary in Bihar to provide protected habitats.

#### Conservation Action Plan (2010–2020)

- Objective: Identify and address threats, including:
  - River traffic and irrigation canals.
  - Depletion of prey-base and habitat degradation.
- Outcome: Provided a blueprint for species protection and threat mitigation.

### **National Aquatic Animal Status (2009)**

• Declared as **India's National Aquatic Animal** to raise awareness and encourage community-driven conservation efforts.

# Project Dolphin (2020)

- Launch: Announced by Prime Minister Narendra Modi to replicate the success of **Project** Tiger.
- Focus Areas:
  - **Systematic monitoring:** Track status and threats to dolphins.
  - Evidence-based conservation: Develop and implement action plans.
- Tagging Exercise: Lightweight tags emit signals picked up by satellites, aiding in data collection and conservation.

## Conservation as an Umbrella Strategy

- Umbrella Species Concept: Conservation of Ganges river dolphins benefits overall riverine ecosystems, including:
  - Associated biodiversity.
  - Human communities dependent on healthy river systems.

# **Implications of Recent Tagging Initiative**

- Improved Strategies: Data from tagging will help refine conservation strategies.
- Holistic Impact: Efforts align with sustainable riverine ecosystem management, contributing to habitat restoration and biodiversity preservation.
