Key Highlights of Pravasi Bharatiya Divas (PBD) 2025

- Event Details:
 - The President of Trinidad and Tobago, Christine Carla Kangaloo, will be the chief guest.
- Historical Background:
 - Pravasi Bharatiya Divas has been celebrated annually since 2003 to honor the contribution of the Indian diaspora in India's development.
 - Since 2015, the format was changed to be held once every two years.
- Significance of January 9:
 - The date marks the return of **Mahatma Gandhi** from South Africa to India on **January 9, 1915**, which was pivotal in India's freedom struggle.

Theme and Objectives

- 2025 Theme: "Diaspora's Contribution to a Viksit Bharat" (Developed India).
- Purpose:
 - To celebrate the bond between India and its overseas Indian community.
 - To highlight the diaspora's role in India's development and strengthen their ties with their place of origin.

Recommendations of the High-Level Committee on Indian Diaspora

- Formation:
 - The committee, headed by LM Singhvi, submitted its recommendations in January 2002.
- Key Proposals:
 - Strengthening linkages between overseas Indians, their place of origin, and each other.
 - Establishment of a **Pravasi Bharatiya Bhavan** as a focal point for networking and commemorating diaspora stories.
 - Introduction of a special day to recognize the Indian diaspora, leading to the first PBD in 2003.

Classification of Overseas Indians

- Categories:
 - 1. Non-Resident Indians (NRIs):
 - Indians residing in foreign countries.
 - 2. Persons of Indian Origin (PIOs):
 - This category was abolished in 2015 and merged with OCI.
 - Refers to foreign citizens of Indian origin (excluding nationals from certain countries like Pakistan, China, etc.).
 - 3. Overseas Citizens of India (OCIs):
 - Introduced in 2006, OCI cards are given to foreign nationals with Indian roots as of January 26, 1950 or those belonging to territories that became part of India after August 15, 1947.

Pravasi Bharatiya Samman Award (PBSA)

- Details:
 - The highest honor conferred on NRIs, PIOs, or their organizations for contributions to India's global image and local diaspora welfare.
- 2025 Awards:



- 27 individuals and organizations will be recognized this year.
- President Droupadi Murmu will confer the awards during the valedictory session.

Historical Evolution of the Indian Diaspora

- Early Migration Waves:
 - 1. Girmitiya Era:
 - During the 19th and early 20th centuries, Indians were sent as indentured laborers to the Caribbean islands and East Pacific countries for plantation work following the abolition of slavery.

2. Second Wave:

Nearly 20 lakh Indians migrated to Singapore and Malaysia to work on farms.

3. Third and Fourth Waves:

- Professionals migrated to Western countries, while workers moved to Gulf and West Asian countries during the oil boom.
- Current Diaspora Population:
 - India's diaspora is over **35.4 million**, with:
 - 19.5 million PIOs.
 - 15.8 million NRIs.
 - The US and UAE host the largest Indian communities, with over 2 million PIOs in the US and 3.5 million NRIs in the UAE.

Economic and Diplomatic Contributions

- Role in India's Economy:
 - Diaspora members significantly contribute through remittances and investments.
 - They are integral to promoting Indian culture and economic ties globally.
- Diplomatic Importance:
 - The diaspora strengthens India's relationship with host countries through soft power, advocacy, and economic cooperation.

Challenges and Opportunities

- Challenges:
 - Need for policies to ensure the welfare of the diaspora, particularly low-income workers in the Gulf.



• Addressing cultural integration and identity concerns in foreign countries.

• Opportunities:

- Leveraging the diaspora for **technology transfer**, **investment opportunities**, and **nation-building initiatives**.
- Enhancing diplomatic influence through the growing Indian population abroad.
