**Pullela Gopichand's Remarks on Sports as a Career**

- However, athletes **dedicate years to training** and face **physical strain and intense competition**.

- The country's sports culture revolves around **big events like the Olympics**.
- Athletes receive **praise and financial rewards** after winning medals but **are forgotten afterward**.
