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We need Hindi as a lokbhasha, not a rajbhasha

Rethinking Hindi's Role as Rajbhasha

- The article challenges the idea of Hindi being the official language (rajbhasha) of India.

- The real harm has been within the Hindi belt itself, where regional languages have been absorbed by Hindi.
- There is some truth to the charge of Hindi imposition, particularly in government mandates and Sanskritized names, which have caused resentment among non-Hindi speakers.

Proposal for Language Equality

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- All 22 languages in the Eighth Schedule should be given equal official status.
- September 14 (Hindi Diwas) should be renamed Bhasha Diwas to celebrate linguistic diversity.
- Hindi promotion efforts should be stopped at the national level and left to Hindi-speaking states and voluntary initiatives.
- A national mission should promote all Indian languages, including documented "dialects."
- Education should be provided in a child's mother tongue, whether it is a Scheduled or non-Scheduled language, to empower regional languages and encourage multilingual culture.

Conclusion

- Hindi should be seen as a people's language (lokbhasha) rather than an official language (rajbhasha).
- Freeing Hindi from its official status would allow it to grow alongside other Indian languages.
- Addressing this imbalance will allow for meaningful discussions about English's linguistic imperialism.
- Promoting linguistic equality will strengthen national unity and intellectual independence.
