NEWS: India has made an ambitious pitch to host the **2036 Olympics**, but the **International Olympic Committee (IOC)** highlighted the **counter-concerns over governance issues and rising doping violations in India**.

• With Brisbane already awarded the 2032 Games, the 2036 edition remains open.

WHAT'S IN THE NEWS?

Major Challenges Facing India's Sports Ecosystem

1. Governance Crisis in Indian Olympic Association (IOA)

- A prolonged **tussle between IOA President P.T. Usha and the Executive Council** has led to administrative paralysis.
- Key disputes include issues over **sponsorship transparency**, alleged financial **mismanagement**, and **appointment of CEO Raghuram Iyer**.
- This internal conflict has significantly **hampered India's preparation** for major multi-sport events like the Olympics and Asian Games.

2. Doping Scandal and Integrity Issues

- According to WADA's 2023 report, India recorded the highest positivity rate for banned substances among major countries.
- A WADA study on minors placed India second only to Russia in doping violations among youth athletes.
- Athletics Integrity Unit (AIU) ranked India second globally in doping cases in track & field as of May 2025, after Kenya.
- These statistics severely **undermine India's global sporting reputation** and pose challenges to fair competition.

3. Underwhelming Performance at Paris Olympics (2024)

- India won only six medals (1 silver, 5 bronze), placing it 71st in the medal tally.
- It ranked below smaller nations such as Georgia, Kazakhstan, and North Korea.
- In stark contrast, the USA (126 medals) and China (91 medals) demonstrated dominance with smaller populations relative to India.

Key Anti-Doping Institutions and Legal Frameworks

1. National Anti-Doping Agency (NADA)

- Established in 2005 under the Societies Registration Act.
- Operates under the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports to:
 - Conduct doping tests.
 - Coordinate awareness campaigns.
 - Implement WADA Code compliance.

2. Indian Olympic Association (IOA) Medical Commission

• Advises IOA on **athlete health, medical protocols**, and **anti-doping measures** for events like the Olympics, Commonwealth, and Asian Games.

3. National Anti-Doping Act, 2022

- First standalone legislation in India for anti-doping governance.
- Key provisions:
 - Legal enforcement of WADA Code.
 - Empowers authorities for search, seizure, and disciplinary action.
 - Establishes Disciplinary and Appeal Panels.
 - Promotes education, research, and outreach on doping.

4. International Commitment

• India is a signatory to the UNESCO International Convention Against Doping in Sport, reinforcing its global obligation.

Government Initiatives and Institutions Supporting Sports

1. Khelo India Program

- Aims to promote grassroots sports, talent identification, and infrastructure creation.
- Encourages school, university, and state-level competitions.

2. National Sports Policy (NSP)

- Sets the national vision for enhancing training quality, infrastructure, and participation.
- Aligns with goals like **Olympic medal performance** and **sports education integration**.

3. Sports Authority of India (SAI)

- Premier training institution under the Sports Ministry.
- Runs National Centres of Excellence (NCOEs) and sports hostels for nurturing elite talent.

4. Target Olympic Podium Scheme (TOPS)

- Provides financial and logistical support to athletes with Olympic medal potential.
- Covers costs for coaching, nutrition, foreign exposure, and competition readiness.

5. Mission Olympic Cell (MOC)

• Functions under the Sports Ministry to **monitor training progress** and **resolve bottlenecks** for TOPS athletes.

6. National Sports Federations (NSFs)

- Recognised and funded by the Government to develop their respective sports.
- Coordinate with the IOA and SAI for national/international participation.

Funding and Welfare Mechanisms

1. National Sports Development Fund (NSDF)

- Provides resources for:
 - Training under international coaches.
 - Development of infrastructure.
 - Sponsorship of promising sportspersons.

2. Pandit Deendayal Upadhyay National Welfare Fund for Sportspersons (PDUNWFS)

- Offers financial support to retired/injured sportspersons and their families.
- Recognizes and preserves the legacy of **yesteryear athletes**.

3. National Sports Awards

• Awards like **Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna**, **Arjuna Award**, and **Dronacharya Award** celebrate sporting excellence and coaching contribution.

Measures Suggested for Reform and Performance Improvement

1. Infrastructure and Funding

- Enhance investment in sports infrastructure, especially in rural and tier-2 cities.
- Upgrade existing facilities and ensure maintenance and accessibility.

2. Early Talent Identification

- Implement school-level scouting programs integrated with physical education.
- Create **regional talent pools** in collaboration with local authorities.

3. Education and Anti-Doping Awareness

- Introduce **anti-doping curriculum** in physical education and coaching certifications.
- Launch mass awareness drives to address doping among minors.

4. Broaden Sporting Base

- Shift focus from cricket to other disciplines like **athletics**, **swimming**, **hockey**, and **indigenous sports** (e.g., Mallakhamb, Kabaddi).
- Build **professional leagues** to increase participation and popularity.

5. Corporate and Community Involvement

- Offer tax incentives for corporate sponsorships in sports.
- Encourage CSR investments in local coaching and youth development.

6. Role Models and Inspiration

- Showcase journeys of **successful athletes** (like Neeraj Chopra, P.V. Sindhu) to motivate youth.
- Use **media campaigns** to build a sports culture at the grassroots.

Concluding Remarks and Olympic Vision 2036

- India's bid to host the **2036 Olympics** is gaining momentum.
- However, success hinges on:
 - Transparent sports governance (clean IOA).

- Reduction in doping cases.
- Improved Olympic medal tally.
- A reformed and performance-driven sports ecosystem is critical to establishing **India as a credible global sporting power**.
