

## 5. Tribal Village Vision 2030 – Economy

On 2nd October 2025, during Special Gram Sabhas held across India, tribal villages and tolas formally adopted the Tribal Village Vision 2030 Declaration as part of the Adi Karmayogi Abhiyan.

### Overview – Adi Karmayogi Abhiyan

**Nature of Initiative** – A national tribal leadership and governance programme launched by the Ministry of Tribal Affairs (MoTA).

**Strategic Alignment** – Part of the Viksit Bharat@2047 vision, aiming at holistic tribal empowerment and inclusion. Key milestone under the Janjatiya Gaurav Varsh celebrations (15 Nov 2024 – 15 Nov 2025), which commemorates tribal heritage and self-governance initiatives.

#### Objective –

1. Develop tribal leadership at the grassroots.
2. Enhance participatory governance, decentralisation, and citizen-centric service delivery in tribal regions.

### Janjatiya Gaurav Varsh (JGV)

**Declared by** – Government of India

**Duration** – 15th November 2024 – 15th November 2025

#### Objectives –

1. Celebrate tribal heritage, culture, and contributions.
2. Promote capacity building and participatory development in tribal areas.
3. Align grassroots initiatives with national developmental goals.

### Tribal Village Vision 2030

**Adoption** – Drafted through special Gram Sabhas on 2nd October 2025 (Gandhi Jayanti).

**Aim** – Enable every tribal village to formulate its decadal development vision (2025–2035). Integrate local priorities with the broader Viksit Bharat@2047 objectives.

#### Scale of Participation –

Coverage – 300 districts and 46,040 villages.

Participants – Over 78 lakh citizens engaged in Village Vision exercises.

Cadre Strength – 7.5 lakh Adi Sathi and Sahyogi personnel deployed for implementation.

Entitlement Delivery – 23 lakh beneficiaries received Aadhaar, Ayushman Bharat, PM-Kisan, and Jan Dhan cards.

### Key Features of Tribal Village Vision 2030

**Community-Led Development** – Activities include Transect Walks, Focused Group Discussions (FGDs), and Gap Analysis to assess local needs.

**Village-Level Priorities** – Each vision declaration outlines actionable goals in –

**Education** – improving literacy, skill development.

**Health** – access to primary care and nutrition.

**Livelihoods** – income generation, sustainable practices.

**Infrastructure** – roads, electricity, water, digital connectivity.

**Social & Financial Inclusion** – ensuring access to schemes and entitlements.

**Integration with Government Schemes** – Village plans mapped with PM JANMAN, Dharti Aaba Janjatiya Gram Utkarsh Abhiyan 2.0, and other central/state schemes, ensuring coordinated development.

**Institutional Mechanism** – Establishment of Adi Sewa Kendras in every village as single-window citizen service centres. **Adi Sewa Samay** – Villagers contribute 1 hour/week voluntarily for community development.

### Technology-Enabled Governance

**Adi Vaani App** – AI-powered platform for real-time communication between officials and tribal communities in local languages. Ensures last-mile delivery of services and responsive feedback

mechanisms.

## Grassroots Leadership Model

**Launch** – 10 July 2025

**Training Scale** – Over 20 lakh officers, SHG women, and tribal youth trained as Adi Karmayogis through 7-day Governance Process Labs.

### Institutional Framework –

**1 Lakh Villages – 1 Vision** – Every village formulates a distinct development vision.

**1 Lakh Adi Sewa Kendras** – Citizen service centres to provide entitlements and track progress.

**Village-Led Grievance Redressal** – Timely resolution of issues and effective scheme delivery.

### Significance of the Initiative

**Empowerment** – Positions tribal citizens as active stakeholders in governance, not passive recipients.

**Decentralisation** – Strengthens participatory democracy via Gram Sabha-based planning.

**Integration with National Vision** – Aligns tribal development with Viksit Bharat@2047 priorities.

**Digital Inclusion** – Adi Vaani App bridges communication gaps, enhancing accountability and transparency.

**Social Equity** – Ensures historically marginalised tribal communities have agency in decision-making.

**Constitutional Alignment** – Resonates with 73rd Constitutional Amendment and PESA Act, reinforcing Gram Sabha-led governance in Scheduled Areas.

**Overall Impact** – Strengthens grassroots governance by integrating traditional knowledge and modern administration. Creates inclusive development plans that are locally relevant yet aligned with national goals. Encourages youth participation and leadership, building future-ready tribal leaders. Promotes digital literacy, social inclusion, and participatory governance across tribal India.
