NEWS: Cabinet raises raw jute MSP by 6% to ₹5,650/per quintal

WHAT'S IN THE NEWS?

The Cabinet has approved an increase in the **Minimum Support Price** (**MSP**) of raw jute to ₹5,650 per quintal for the 2025-26 season, aiming to provide fair compensation to farmers and ensure their income security. Additionally, the government is implementing initiatives under the **National Jute Development Program** (**NJDP**) to promote sustainable jute cultivation, innovation, and market diversification.

1. What is Minimum Support Price (MSP)?

- **Definition**: MSP is the assured price at which the government procures agricultural produce from farmers to protect them against market price fluctuations.
- Purpose:
 - Price Stability: Ensures farmers receive fair compensation regardless of market volatility.
 - Income Security: Safeguards farmers' incomes and shields them from production cost uncertainties.
 - Encourages Crop Cultivation: Provides incentives for farmers to grow specific crops, contributing to food security and industrial needs.

Crops Covered:

- MSP is fixed for 22 crops, divided into:
 - **Kharif Crops**: Paddy, jowar, bajra, ragi, maize, tur, moong, urad, groundnut, sunflower seed, soybean, sesamum, nigerseed, and cotton.
 - Rabi Crops: Wheat, barley, gram, masur, rapeseed, mustard, and safflower.
 - Other Crops: Copra (milling and ball) and raw jute.
- Setting MSP:
 - The Commission for Agricultural Costs & Prices (CACP) recommends MSP annually after evaluating:
 - Cost of production.
 - Demand-supply dynamics.
 - Market trends and international prices.



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Inputs from state governments and relevant central ministries are considered.



- weighted average cost of production
- This price is an increase of ₹ 315/- per quintal over previous Marketing season 2024-25
- Government has increased MSP of Raw jute from ₹ 2400 per quintal in 2014-15 to ₹ 5,650 per quintal in 2025-26, registering a 2.35 times increase



2. Government's Efforts for Jute Sector Development Jute Packaging Material Act, 1987

- Ensures mandatory use of jute for packaging commodities:
 - 100% reservation for food grains.
 - 20% reservation for sugar.
- Promotes eco-friendly packaging and reduces reliance on synthetic alternatives like plastics.

National Jute Development Program (NJDP)

A government umbrella scheme (2021-22 to 2025-26) that aims to boost jute cultivation, processing, and market expansion. The NJDP includes the following sub-schemes:

- 1. Improved Cultivation and Advanced Retting Exercise (Jute ICARE):
 - Encourages scientific jute farming methods for better productivity.
 - Improves retting practices to enhance the fiber quality of raw jute.
- 2. Jute Resource cum Production Centre (JRCPC):
 - Trains artisans and promotes diversification of jute products to meet modern consumer demands.
- 3. Jute Raw Material Bank (JRMB):

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• Supplies raw jute to MSMEs and artisans at mill-gate prices to reduce production costs for Jute Diversified Products (JDPs).

4. Jute Design Resource Centre (JDRC):

- Develops innovative, market-worthy designs for jute products.
- Assists exporters and manufacturers in upgrading their product portfolio.

5. Production Linked Incentive (PLI) Scheme:

- Supports jute mills and MSMEs in manufacturing and exporting JDPs.
- Aims to make Indian jute products globally competitive.

6. Market Development Activities:

- Jute Mark Logo: Certifies quality of jute diversified products.
- Awareness Campaigns: Promotes the use of jute in domestic and international markets.

Jute Corporation of India (JCI)

- Founded: 1971 as a government-owned price support agency.
- Objective: Ensures procurement of raw jute from farmers at MSP to protect their livelihoods.
- Social Mission:
 - Not focused on profit-making but on safeguarding the interests of over 4 million jute farming families.
 - Addresses challenges like fluctuating jute prices and market demand.

3. Impact of the Increased MSP on Raw Jute

- Farmer Welfare: The increase in MSP to ₹5,650 per quintal provides better income stability for jute farmers.
- Boost to Jute Cultivation: Encourages farmers to grow more jute, reducing dependency on synthetic fibers for packaging.
- Sustainability Promotion: Aligns with India's commitment to eco-friendly practices by promoting biodegradable and renewable materials like jute.
- Industrial Growth: Strengthens the jute manufacturing sector and supports MSMEs engaged in jute production.

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
