- A turnaround began in the early 2000s with higher-level exchanges, but the real momentum accelerated under Modi's leadership since 2016, with three significant visits.
- This signals India's shift from *passive diplomacy to strategic prioritization* of the Gulf region.

Strategic and Economic Convergence

- The relationship has evolved beyond oil trade and Indian diaspora ties.
- India and Saudi Arabia are now cooperating in:
 - Counterterrorism and intelligence sharing
 - Technology transfer and innovation
 - Infrastructure and investment projects
 - Renewable energy and industrial development
- The frequency of bilateral visits and MoUs indicates a maturing, **multi-sectoral partnership**.



The MbS Factor: Modernising Saudi Arabia

- Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman's leadership has driven sweeping economic, political, and social reforms.
- Governance has shifted from traditional consensus to a **centralised and decisive model**, enabling faster implementation but attracting criticism over authoritarian methods.
