Jaishankar says India is looking for partners, not preachers; highlights New Delhi's 'Russia realism'

1. India's Call for Equal Partnerships, Not Moral Lectures

- Jaishankar made a strong remark that **India is looking for "partners, not preachers"**, indirectly referring to certain European countries.
- He criticized the tendency of some Western nations to lecture developing countries while failing to uphold those standards domestically.
- He stressed that mutual respect, shared interests, and sensitivity must form the basis of any meaningful international partnership with India.

2. Criticism of Europe's Approach

- Europe, according to Jaishankar, has now entered a "zone of reality check" in global geopolitics, especially after the Ukraine crisis.
- He urged Europe to move beyond its traditional superiority complex and align itself with ground realities in building equitable partnerships.
- He remarked that while some European nations have evolved, others are still grappling with old frameworks of international relations.

3. India's "Russia Realism" Approach

- India maintains a realist and strategic relationship with Russia, viewing it as an important fit in the global order.
- He noted that India sees complementarity with Russia, especially in the context of Russia as a resource provider and India as a resource consumer.
- Despite global pressures, **India increased its crude oil imports** from Russia during the war, putting **national interest above ideological pressure**.

4. Neutrality in the Russia-Ukraine Conflict

• India has **consistently refrained from taking sides** or **prescribing solutions** in the Russia-Ukraine war.

- Jaishankar emphasized that **India has never told any party what to do**, respecting their sovereignty and the complexity of the conflict.
- He called out the **West's flawed assumption** that a peace solution could be achieved **without involving Russia**, which he said, "challenged the basics of realism."

5. Broader Critique of the Western Approach

- The EAM criticized past attempts by the West to solve global conflicts based on ideology rather than strategic engagement.
- He emphasized that such one-sided efforts often fail because they ignore geopolitical complexity and stakeholder interests.
- Jaishankar's statement reflects India's assertive foreign policy stance, advocating realism and sovereignty in international affairs.

6. India's Stand on Engaging Both Russia and the U.S.

- Jaishankar said he is a believer in both Russia realism and America realism.
- He stressed that India's engagement with the U.S. should also be grounded in mutual interests, not dictated by ideological alignment or values-first diplomacy.
- This reflects India's balancing act between major global powers, using strategic autonomy as its core principle.

7. Developments in the Arctic and Changing World Order

- The discussion was part of the Arctic Circle India Forum, where Jaishankar linked geopolitical shifts to developments in the Arctic region.
- He suggested that emerging changes in power dynamics, climate implications, and trade routes in the Arctic require global attention and realistic strategies.
- India's interest in Arctic affairs reflects its evolving global posture, emphasizing inclusivity, sovereignty, and long-term strategic vision.

8. Underlining National Interest as Foreign Policy Principle

- Throughout his statements, Jaishankar reiterated that India's foreign policy is interest-driven, not driven by alliances or blocs.
- Be it oil from Russia, neutrality in global conflicts, or engagement with Europe and the U.S., India's decisions are rooted in realism, autonomy, and practical benefits.
