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TOPIC: INDIA AND NEIGHBOURS

Trumpeting claims: On the U.S. President's claims, India and Pakistan

1. Context: Emerging Diplomatic Tensions

- Following **Operation Sindoor** and the ceasefire announced on **May 10**, the **U.S. President claimed credit** for mediating peace between India and Pakistan.
- These statements have **triggered strategic unease** in New Delhi, especially due to their implications on India's sovereignty and bilateral diplomacy principles.

2. Background of the Ceasefire

- Operation Sindoor** led to intense military exchanges between India and Pakistan.
- A **ceasefire was achieved through direct military-level talks** between the **Director Generals of Military Operations (DGMOs)** of both countries.
- The U.S. President's repeated **assertion of his role in mediating** has contradicted facts and diplomatic norms.

3. India's Official Rebuttal

- The **Ministry of External Affairs (MEA)** categorically **denied any third-party involvement**.
- India clarified that the ceasefire was a result of **bilateral military communication**, and not influenced or mediated by any external power.
- MEA stated that while **international partners were informed**, they were **not involved** in any negotiation or decision-making.

4. India's Strategic Concerns

- The **language used by the U.S. President** places India and Pakistan on **equal footing**, which India strongly opposes, especially in light of **Pakistan-sponsored terrorism**.
- India has always maintained that **Kashmir and other bilateral issues must be resolved without third-party mediation**, a principle violated by such statements.
- The reference to **"nuclear brinkmanship"** and **threats of using trade leverage** are seen as undermining **India's diplomatic autonomy** and portraying it as an unstable actor.

5. Risks to India's Global Narrative



- The U.S. President's comments risk **eroding India's longstanding position** on:
 - **Non-internationalization of Kashmir.**
 - **Pakistan's accountability for terrorism.**
- It could **dilute international support** for India's stand against cross-border terrorism if left unchallenged.
- Misrepresentation also harms India's **credibility as a responsible regional power.**

6. Strategic Messaging Required

- India must **strongly assert its independent decision-making** and the **legitimacy of its actions** under international law.
- Diplomatic forums such as the **United Nations, QUAD, and G20** can be used to **clarify and reaffirm India's principled stand.**
- India should **highlight bilateral mechanisms** like the DGMOs' dialogue as a model for responsible state behavior.

7. Strengthening Bilateral Engagement with the U.S.

- India should **proactively engage with U.S. institutions** — including the **State Department, Congress, and strategic community** — to clarify the facts.
- High-level diplomatic dialogues and visits can help **neutralize the misinformation** and protect long-term strategic interests.

8. Way Forward: Coordinated Diplomatic Strategy

- **Reaffirm bilateralism** as the **core principle** in India-Pakistan relations and firmly oppose third-party mediation in all forums.
- **Enhance diplomatic outreach in the U.S.:**
 - Utilize **think tanks, diaspora networks, and academic institutions** to shape narratives.
 - Mobilize Indian-American communities and **media channels** to counter false perceptions.
- Emphasize India's **record as a responsible nuclear power** and **victim of state-sponsored terrorism**, to regain narrative control in global forums.
