Asian Giant Tortoise Reintroduction: Environment

The Asian Giant Tortoise (Manouria emys), the largest tortoise species in mainland Asia, is listed as *Endangered* under the IUCN Red List due to habitat loss and poaching. Conservation efforts in Northeast India focus on captive breeding, habitat restoration, and community-based protection. Asian Giant Tortoise Reintroduction – Nagaland

Recent Development

10 Asian Giant Tortoises reintroduced into Zeliang Community Reserve, Nagaland.

Organisers: Nagaland Forest Department + India Turtle Conservation Programme (ITCP). Tortoises bred & head-started at Nagaland Zoological Park. Soft-released with Very High Frequency (VHF) tags **for** post-release monitoring. VHF Technology Range 30–300 MHz in the electromagnetic spectrum. Used for wildlife tracking and monitoring.

Asian Giant Tortoise (Manouria emys)

- 1. Status: Largest land tortoise in mainland Asia.
- 2. Nickname: "Small elephant of the forest" due to its size & ecological role.
- 3. Habitat Range: Tropical & subtropical forests India, Bangladesh, Myanmar, Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia.
- 4. Distribution in India: Historically in Northeast India, especially Nagaland & Arunachal Pradesh.
- 5. Longevity: 80–100 years.
- 6. Diet: Herbivorous feeds on leaves, fruits, mushrooms, decomposing plant matter.
- 7. Ecological Role: Keystone species crucial for seed dispersal, soil turnover, forest regeneration. Loss of keystone species can cause ecosystem imbalance or collapse.

Conservation Status

- 1. IUCN Red List: Critically Endangered.
- 2. CITES: Appendix II.
- 3. Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972: Schedule IV.

India Turtle Conservation Programme (ITCP)

Initiative under Turtle Survival Alliance (TSA), formed in 2001. Focus Area, Ganga–Brahmaputra plains – turtles, Gangetic dolphins, crocodilians, and their habitats.

Activities

- 1. Conservation & habitat protection.
- 2. Community outreach & education.
- 3. Research & monitoring.

Turtle Survival Alliance (TSA)

Established in 2001, in response to the Asian Turtle Crisis. The Mission was "Zero turtle extinctions in the 21st century."

Three-pronged strategy

- 1. Restore wild populations habitat protection, field research.
- 2. Secure species in captivity breeding programs.
- 3. Empower communities local stewardship & conservation training.

Turtle Survival Alliance Foundation – India (TSAFI)

Established in 2016 as Indian arm of TSA. Work Field projects, research, and community engagement for India's endemic & endangered turtles.

Zeliang Community

- 1. Tribe: Zeliang subgroups include Zeme, Liangmai, Rongmei.
- 2. Location: Peren district, Nagaland.

Culture

- 1. Practice jhum (shifting) cultivation.
- 2. Celebrate Hega festival.

Conservation Role

- 1. Actively conserve forests via community reserves.
- 2. Local youths trained as 'tortoise guardians' to protect species & collect data.
